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March 1, 2014 is Deadline to Register to Sing in RWC

The deadline to register to sing in the Rotary World Choir at the RI Convention in Sydney, Australia is just about here: March 1, 2014. Please go to www.IFRM.org and click on RWC Sydney to complete the on-line application form. You can pay on-line through PayPal or send a check for \$30 USD to IFRM/RWC, P.O.Box 10955, Pleasanton, CA 94588.

"The Convention is early this year and it takes a while to order the music, prepare the CDs for the different voices and send out the packets to singers. I would like to have the music in the singers' hands in plenty of time for them to practice their parts before arriving in Sydney," explains Judith.

Each participant will be mailed music, badge and practice CD by the end of April 2014. Since choir director Walker is selecting new music for presentation, it will be important to review each piece in your voice. As usual, there will be only 1-1/2 hours of practice time. You must attend the rehearsal in order to sing at the Interfaith Service.

Keeping the Beat...

IFRM member **Don Lewis** (RC of Pleasanton, CA) believes that "Music is one of the most powerful ways to inspire the human spirit." Don is an accomplished performing musician and music technology innovator as well as recording artist, composer, and teacher of Gospel Music Heritage. Throughout his more than 45 years as a professional musician, Don Lewis has brought to his listeners messages of hope, respect, and community through his music.

Don's musical journey began with the ukulele followed by piano and organ lessons after the age of 15. He played both in high school and regularly at his church accompanying several of the choirs. Following high school, he attended Tuskegee Institute where he accompanied and sang with the Tuskegee Chorus. It was during this time he had the opportunity to play for Martin Luther King, Jr. at Greenwood Baptist Church. "Playing for Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s Freedom Rallies were high points in my career," he states. Don considers Bach, Quincy Jones, James Cleveland and Shirley Scott his greatest musical influences.

Don organizes and works with his club's music team to present music for weekly club meetings. He also is an active participant in musical fundraisers and has performed music at several Rotary District Conferences over the years. He also served as the entertainment director one year for District 5170.

"My first glimpse of Rotary on an international basis was singing with the IFRM-sponsored *Rotary World Choir* at the Bangkok convention (2012). The coming together of people from around the world is something I'd like to see more Rotarians experience," Don stated.

Don is recognized in the music industry as a pioneer in electronic musical instrument technology. "Electronics fascinated me and my engineering background helped me understand how to combine

electronics and music." In 1977 he designed and built a synthesizer system called LEO (Live Electronic Orchestra). His console design included three keyboards and a pedal keyboard that blended sounds of many



instruments. "I wanted the parts of this machine to be visible so I encased all the equipment in acrylic material which also produced a beautiful and dramatic effect when under stage lights." His design for LEO, now on display at the Museum of Making Music in Carlsbad, CA, was the inspiration for MIDI (Musical Instrument Digital Interface) developed in 1983 by Ikutaro Kakehashi (Founder of Roland Corp) and Dave Smith (Sequential Circuits) who received Grammy Technical Awards in 2013.

Combining his love of children, education, and music, in 1987 Don created *Say Yes to Music* musical assemblies which have delighted students, teachers, and school administrators across the United States and Canada. He has taught courses in the history and roots of Gospel Music, multimedia and synthesizer technology at the University of California at Berkeley Extension and Road Scholar (formerly Elder Hostel) and has taught electronic music seminars at San Jose State University and Stanford University.

During his career, Don has performed at Carnegie Hall, the Sydney Opera House, and elsewhere around the world both as a soloist and with symphony orchestras. As a studio artist, he has worked with Michael Jackson, Quincy Jones, and Sergio Mendez. Don's scores for film and television productions include the award-winning *Rainbows End* and *Were You There* series featured on PBS.

Don Lewis' recording label is *Music in the Air Recordings*. A documentary film entitled *The Ballad of Don Lewis* is being made about Don and his musical work. Find out more about Rotarian Don Lewis at http://donlewismusic.com.

"We did this Rotary benefit together with another choir and with children from my *Singschule Mannheim*, ten Rotary Clubs and an Inner Wheel Club. It was a wonderful musical experience for everyone and, imagine, that evening we raised over 7.000-€ for a children's hospital" states German Rotary Choir artistic director **Elke Voelker**. "Making these musical projects is always a win/win situation for both sides: for ourselves, feeling the joy of singing and for others, the benefit derived from receiving the monies we raise."

IFRM is one of the very few Rotarian Fellowships that has its own charitable Foundation. It was created to support:

- Music in Rotary Clubs
- Community and regional music education
- Programs that promote indigenous music literacy

In the past the IFRM Foundation has provided musical instruments for hurricane wrecked schools in New Orleans and the Caribbean Island of Grenada. We provided CDs and music-related books to the Philippines for a vehicle that was equipped as a mobile media center. We supplied instruments to young people in Eastern Europe and more recently the IFRM Foundation provided funds to purchase music equipment for a new school band in Kampala, Uganda.

You can help the IFRM Foundation in two particular ways. First, the Foundation needs a stream of income in order to fund its aid programs. Donations from US-based members are 'tax deductible'. Second, it needs your ideas and suggestions for where and how it can help people.

A cautionary word, the Foundation does not normally support individuals by awarding scholarships or bursaries, but prefers to fund music-based activities that benefit a group or community. To safeguard the use of our funds, we always work through a local Rotary Club. Please give some thought as to how you or your Club can use music to benefit those we seek to serve and let us have your ideas as to whom we might help. For those of you who are coming, make sure you allow yourselves some extra time to visit a little more of Australia than just Sydney – we have a lot to offer! Brush up on some of our well-known songs – I know you all know *Waltzing Matilda* but what of *The Redback on the Toilet Seat* or *The Pub with No Beer?* For the uninitiated in Australian country music, *The Redback on the Toilet Seat* was written and performed by Slim Newton. It was released in June 1972 and peaked at No. 3 on the *Go-Set* National Top 40 Singles Chart.

A Pub With No Beer is the title of a humorous country song made famous by country singers Slim Dusty (in Australia and the USA) and Bobbejaan Schoepen (in Belgium, the Netherlands Germany and Austria). A Pub With No Beer became the first Australian single to go gold and was the biggest-selling record by an Australian at that time. It was the first single by an Australian artist to make the British charts. In 1959, Dusty wrote and recorded a sequel The Answer To A Pub With No Beer, explaining the reason for the beer delivery truck's failure to arrive and describing the townsmen's efforts to solve the problem. Another sequel, The Sequel To A Pub With No Beer, shows that the town now has a guaranteed delivery, thanks to air freight.

Whilst we are in the middle of some extremely hot weather at present (up to 100F and over in many places) it will be a lot cooler in May/June, so come prepared! We look forward to seeing you. G'day mate!

Introducing Malcolm Charles

When the call went out for Country Chairs, the first IFRM member to step forward to volunteer was **Malcolm Charles**. After several on-line conversations with the Chair, he agreed to take on the responsibility of Vice-Chair/Caribbean. Malcolm has extensive experience for this role.

He joined the Rotary Club of Saint Lucia in 1981 as a 'second generation' Rotarian and Graduate of Nottingham Trent University in the UK. His classification is Corporate Consulting (Malcolm is a Chartered Management Practitioner). He has held successive



Rotary offices, including Club Secretary, Director of various Avenues of Service, Vice President and Club President 1987/88. He was appointed Assistant Governor 1990 through 1993.

Malcolm spearheaded various Club projects, including St Lucia's first Mobile Blood Bank, Vocational Training Seminars, and Career Guidance Series for various high schools.

He founded the *Rotary Calabashers*, a Music Performing Group, in 2004. As Chairman, he led a group to the RI Centennial Convention in Chicago in June 2005, where they performed his 'signature' composition titled *Service Above Self: 100 Years* as the Caribbean's Tribute to the Rotary Centennial. On their return home, the *Calabashers* staged a series of annual Rotary Benefit Concerts in support of various charities.

Malcolm spearheaded the funding and subsequent launch of a \$350K Rotary Mobile Youth Counselling Coach, taking Micro Financing Skills Training and Medical Services to remote areas.

An IFRM Member since 2000, his musical skills include Keyboards (piano and organ), Guitar and Baritone Choral Music.

A Paul Harris Fellow, he was granted an 'OBE' Award at Buckingham Palace in 2002 and from 2012 holds the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal for outstanding Humanitarian Services to his Community.
